


### NUMBER OF PRACTICING OCCUPATIONAL THERAPISTS


### NUMBER OF NON WFOT APPROVED EDUCATION PROGRAMMES





#### **SUMMARY**

### Information was collated from 86 WFOT Member Organisations (98% of those surveyed)

The numbers below reflect the responses provided to WFOT from countries that responded to this project and collate this data.

### **Total number of practising occupational therapists = 527,997**

Total number of WFOT Approved Education Programmes = 906 Total number of non WFOT Approved Education Programmes = 350

Number of occupational therapy students studying on WFOT Approved education programmes = 97,687 Number of occupational therapy assistants = 62,298

Average percentage of occupational therapists that are female = 87%

Not all organisations collate data that was requested for this project.

Missing data should not be interpreted as being not applicable; in some instances the information is not known or unable to be provided.

The Human Resources Project was circulated in English and also in Spanish to Spanish speaking countries.
